BLUF: Strategic Failure Ahead

Global system, strategy demand global power

- Anything less than a two-theater force does not meet strategy
- Withdrawal from Middle East unhinges US global strategy
- AEI '2-1-1' posture does not fully resource two-war capability

'Patrol, hold, hope' strategy

- 'Patrol' in East Asia, Middle East
- 'Hold' with airpower in one theater while deploying from CONUS
- 'Hope' nuclear deterrence buys time for restoring conventional strength

Military posture: Quantity has a quality all its own

- Full sequestration means American decline, increased global instability
- Half sequestration slows but does not halt pace of decline
- AEI 'unconstrained' option less than BCA spending levels

PH2: A 'Tight-Rope' Strategy

Future is now: 'We'll all be dead in 20YY'

- There can be no 'strategic pause,' systemic crisis looms
- Retaining strategic 'breadth,' rebuilding strategic 'depth'

First steps: Reposturing the force

- Pacific presence: Sea services to the front
- Middle East: Reestablishing toeholds ashore
- Air Force is the 'swing force'
- Greater reliance on nuclear deterrence


Move 2: Mass and modernization

- Keep what you've got: No reduction in service size
- Buy what you can: More program of record


Long-term strategy: Prepare for preeminence

- Presence not a 'lesser included case'
- QDR focus should be on winning wars, not fighting battles

'Pivot:' Patrol the Front, Defend in Depth




Pivot: No Quiet on the Pacific Front

Demands of 'Pivot' Posture


Forward basing: Disperse, harden, increase

- NEA: Improve ability to host tankers; create 'FARP teams' for F-35B, Ryukyus
- SEA: Airfields for P-8s, UAVs; Philippines: 'LCS group;' port, airfield upgrades
- Taiwan: Prepare for 'road-mobile' operations
- Building Depth: Northern Australia: 'Second Guam'

Forces: Increased operational agility


- Navy: 1.5 CVGB, add F-35B to air wing, double sub capacity, increase complement and diversify mix of surface combatants
- Marine: 1.5 ARG (America class), accelerate F-35B, disperse through Ryukyus
- **Air Force:** Add F-35Bs, create 'FARP' capacity, develop 6th gen air superiority fighter
- Army: Retain Korea garrison, add SRBM/IRBM in Ryukyus
- Building partnerships: Develop and exercise C2, build regional ASW architecture, proliferate F-35B, maritime surveillance and patrol capabilities (UAVs, P-3/8, small craft, LCS, new 'coalition' frigate)

'Re-Pivot': Reinventing US Posture



Demands of 'Re-Pivot' Posture

Forward Basing: 'Platforms' for Force Projection

- <u>'AfPak'</u>: 25,000 strength, CT embedded in train & assist force, platform for 'reception and onward movement' of follow-on forces
- Persian Gulf: Retain current naval posture, bolster land-based air
- Jordan: 'Second Kuwait;' 5,000-7,500 strength; power projection platform
- Horn of Africa: Upgrade JTF-HOA for FID missions
- West Africa: Create 'JTF-WA' for regional CT, partner-building

Forces: Retain CT/COIN presence, add combat power

- Navy: 1 CVGB with F-35C, accompanying surface combatants, 'LCS group' for Gulf of Guinea
- Marine: 1 ARG rotation: West Africa-Med-Red Sea-HOA
- Air Force: Add 2 composite wings in Jordan, Saudi Arabia
- Army: HQ plus 3 brigades in AfPak, HQ plus 1 BCT in Jordan, HQ plus JTF in WA
- Building partnerships: broaden CT/COIN coalitions, rebuild Gulf-centered
 'Moderate Sunni-Israel' coalition

Danger: AEI Unconstrained!

Force development: Keep mass, accelerate modernization

- Personnel: Retain current force size, marginal civilian reduction
- Modernization: Buy stealthy fighters (esp. F-35B), tankers, bombers, subs, surface combatants
- Basing and access: Maximize in both Pacific and Greater Middle East
- Readiness: Accept partial tiered readiness, improve sustainment
- Long-term investments: Unmanned systems, space, comms, logistics

Defense budgets: Points of reference

- Versus BCA: Our 'unconstrained' less than pre-BCA levels
- Versus GDP: Our 'unconstrained' fails to reach '4 percent for freedom'
- Versus sequestration: \$780B shortfall

Final thoughts: Strategic risk reduced, not eliminated

- Presence risk: Lowered; now 'acceptable'
- Crisis/initial conflict risk: Lowered; now 'manageable'
- War-winning risks: Remain significant; 'long war' and 'second war' issues
